Better schools

Progress on traffic and parking

A record number of residents attended Sutton Local Committee on 3rd November for the second discussion on traffic and parking issues.

At the first meeting, in September, residents had identified 22 parking and traffic hot spots. Council officers came to the meeting with possible solutions. A number of issues will be actioned straight away:

- survey of speeding traffic in All Saints Road.
- enforcement against
 - -blocking of crossovers in Benhilton Gdns -parking on corners and verges in Gloucester Gdns
 - -obstructions caused in Grennell Close during school opening and closing times -parking near Westbourne Primary

The other hot spots can only be dealt with through a more controlled approach to parking over the whole area to avoid simply moving parking from one street to another. We agreed to begin informal consultations with residents on introducing better parking controls and a 20 mph speed limit.

The consultation on better parking controls will be in two phases. The first will be to set out on a map where it is safe to park, and where it should be prohibited - either on safety grounds or where it would block access. All residents will be consulted on these plans by letter in January.

Once the plans have been finally agreed by the Sutton Local Committee at their meeting on 15 March, there will be further road by road consultation on what kind of parking restriction should be implemented to suit the needs of residents in each road.

The first stage for the 20 mph limit will be the installation of monitors to measure the volume and speed of traffic across the ward. Plans for the new limit will also come to the March Committee meeting for approval.

This is quite a major exercise, which will set the parking standards for some time to come, so we urge you to respond to the consultation letters when they arrive.

Updates on other issues

Ruth, Marlene and Steve have been in touch with residents on a number of planning applications in our area: Blenheim Road, Benhilton Gardens, and the redevelopment of the carpet shop in Sutton Common Road.

They have also been in touch about the proposal for double yellow lines at the Benhill Wood Road/ All Saints junction and for pavement parking in Calthorpe Gardens.

They will continue to keep residents informed as these issues progress.


